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PROFESSIONAL ARTISTS GENERATE NEW WORK FOR UPCOMING COCA PRODUCTIONS

Choreographic Lab Showcase & Kaleidoscope Crown Feature New Work Performed by COCA's Young Artists

ST. LOUIS—This November, <u>COCA-Center of Creative Arts</u> will present *Choreographic Lab Showcase* (November 5–6) featuring choreography by COCA Alumnus Mason Cummings and *Kaleidoscope Crown* (November 13) by playwright Ashleigh Akilah Rucker. Cummings and Rucker are two artistic voices generating new work in the St. Louis region and developing COCA's young student artists.

Cummings is an interdisciplinary choreographer, dancer, and writer. He has studied at COCA, The Ailey School, and NYU's Tisch School of the Arts. His choreography has been presented at the Jack Crystal Theater in New York City and Spoke the Hub's Solo Fancy.

Rucker is a writer, director, and producer from San Diego, California. She studied at the University of California and has spent a decade using theatre and the arts to educate underserved communities throughout Southern California. Her short films include #Click and We Three, and she directed Rusty Proctor's Faith Ties.

This performance presents the culmination of COCA alumnus Mason Cummings' Choreographic Lab experience at COCA. Under the guidance of Co-Artistic Directors of Dance Kirven Douthit-Boyd and Antonio Douthit-Boyd and mentors Claudia Schreier, Gemma Bond, Jamar Roberts, and Tommie-Waheed Evans, Cummings has worked with COCA Pre-Professional Division students in Ballet Eclectica and COCAdance to present a showcase of his choreography and share his experience of his 6-week journey at COCA.

Kaleidoscope Crown tells the story of a young girl who awakes with a shocking new ability: with every new feeling her hair is catapulted into multicolor tresses. Her new development throws the uniformity and peace of her small traditional village into disarray. Rucker draws inspiration from the art and traditions of the African Diaspora bringing the culture to the forefront of this work.
